The cemetery is an official state historical cemetery. It has seven historical markers honoring leaders, characters, and icons that helped shape and form the Henderson County community and beyond.

Contained in this newsletter is a historical spotlight that provides a short summary of each marker including the newest marker honoring Sid W. Richardson.

WE HONOR THE FALLEN

The Veterans' Memorial contains the names of veterans who have served their country dating back to the mid-1800's.

Conflicts represented include the Cherokee Indian War, the Spanish-American War, the Civil War, World War I and World War II, the Korean War, the Vietnam War, and the Iraq and Afghanistan Wars.

Each year the wall is updated with the name of veterans who were laid to rest. The names are permanently engraved in the granite monument, categorized by the conflict in which the veteran served.

The impressive 50' long, 10' high structure consists of eight granite panels inlaid in brick. The Veterans' Memorial is illuminated at night and has a plaza to honor the veterans. A United States flag stands as a silent sentinel over the memorial.

The wall was made possible by the generous donations of the Friends of the Cemetery.

Historical Spotlight . . .

Perhaps you know that the Athens Cemetery has been designated as a Historical Cemetery by the State of Texas. The cemetery proudly displays a bronzed plaque at its main entrance gate that boasts this designation. Did you know, however, that there are six additional historic markers within the cemetery boundaries? The existing markers are summarized and you are encouraged to visit the graves and markers on your next visit. You will indeed learn something you did not know about these pioneers and leaders of our city and county.

Dulcinea Ann Holland Mrs. Thompson Avriett (1834-1920) - A native of Athens, Georgia, Dulcinea Holland came to Henderson County with her family in 1847. She married E. J. Thompson in 1851. According to local tradition, she named the town of Athens after her birthplace. Following the death of her first husband in the 1860's, she married James Avriett in 1867. They were parents of two sons. She was a founding member of the local Methodist Church and a dedicated civic leader.

Clinton Williams "Clint" Murchison, Sr. (April 11, 1895 - June 20, 1969) -Clinton Williams "Clint" Murchison, Sr. was a noted Texas-based oil magnate and political operative. Among his companies was the Southern Union Gas Company. He was also the father of Dallas Cowboys owner, Clint Murchison, Jr. and John Dabney Murchison. In 1943, Murchison married Virginia Long. He diversified his holdings into life insurance, banking, publishing, real estate, ranching, and railroads. He retired to Glad Oak Estate in the early 1960's frequenting local cattle sales and inspecting his ranches in the area. His influence reached not only the oil industry, but many other areas of business and commerce.

Rupert Talmage Craig (November 17, 1889 - February 15, 1968) - Born in Shiloh, Kentucky, he began setting type in a print shop at the age of 10. At the gae of 16, he became the youngest licensed printer in Kentucky. He worked for several major U.S. newspapers before coming to work for the "Athens Review" in 1907. He purchased the Athens Review in 1916 and it became a successful daily newspaper. His distinctive editorials on politics and local events earned him the respect of area citizens and prominent state and national politicians. He sold the Athens Review in 1941 after 25 years as its publisher.

John Matthews McDonald (1827-1883) - Born in North Carolina, he came to Texas in 1848 and first lived at Larissa, Cherokee County and then Mound Prairie, Anderson County, Texas where his brother Murdoch had settled earlier. He moved to Athens in 1850 and became a teacher and lawyer. He served as the town's first mayor. During the Civil War, he fought with Hood's Texas Brigade. He was active in public service serving as justice of the peace, county judge, and state representative. His early leadership was vital to the development of his adopted home.

Joseph Thomas and Stella Parsons Larue - Stella Parsons was known as the first white child born in Terrell, Texas to Dr. Homer Lee Parsons and Margaret C. R. R. Parsons. Joseph Thomas LaRue was an Alderman on Athens' first city council. LaRue, 13 miles east of Athens, was named for him. He was known as an educator, merchant, civic leader, banker, humanitarian, demorat, prohibitionist and historian.

HONORING A LOCAL LEGEND

On November 25, 2017, the Athens Cemetery dedicated its sixth historical marker honoring an individual - Athens native, **Sid W. Richardson.**

Mr. Richardson was a Texas Wildcatter that grew into an icon in the United States and world business circles. He was a friend and advisor to presidents, world business and civic leaders. The Rev. Billy Graham was a personal friend to Mr. Richardson and presided at Mr. Richardson's funeral service in Fort Worth.

Sid's relationship and partnership with boyhood friend, Clint Murchison, Sr., another Athens native, is legendary. Their friendship and superior business acumen coupled with an "Art of Making the Deal" attitude spawned the creation, acquisition, and purchase of oil companies, railroads, insurance companies and other business ventures that propelled them to the pinnacle of the business world in the 1930's to 1960's. This remarkable story of two Henderson County country boys that rose from rural Texas to become two of the most respected, successful business and industry icons of the 20th century.

The life of Mr. Richardson continues to have a tremendous impact on humanity and charitable endeavors through the Sid Richardson Foundation located in Fort Worth, Texas.

Special thanks go to former Athens Cemetery board member and historian, Art Hall, and to board member, Chip Perryman for their tireless work and contributions in making this dedication a success.

REASONABLE RATES

The sale of each lot/space within the Athens Cemetery is handled by transfer of deed. The purchaser then owns the property in its entirety. The Athens Cemetery Association maintains the cemetery, but individual property owners may also tend their plots as they deem necessary. The transference of deed also aids in genealogical research as it provides the researcher with a clear path of ownership.

Currently, there remain 4,000 lots/spaces available within the historic grounds (including cremation lots and Columbarium niches). The map will help you in identifying availability and consider pricing.

Principal and Historic Sections \$1,100.00 per space

> Celtic Cross Section \$1,450.00 per space

Multi-Lot Family Section \$1,000.00 per space (Burial spaces sold in groups of 8 or more and may be landscaped to suit buyer)

A traditional burial is not the only form of interment. If your loved one has chosen cremation over burial, perhaps you could consider purchasing a niche in our Columbarium. Each niche is reasonably priced at \$1,500.00 and will accommodate up to two individual urns.

FRIENDS OF THE CEMETERY

While the Athens Cemetery Association is tasked with the day-to-day maintenance of the grounds at the Athens Cemetery, periodically there are needs at the cemetery that could cause the property to suffer financial hardships if met from the general fund. In 2002, forty-seven charter families put their financial support into what became known as the Friends of the Cemetery. Today, that number exceeds 150.

In October of 2003, an impressive seven-foot high Celtic cross was placed in the center of a newly expanded section of the cemetery. At its base is a circular red brick bench. The cross represented the first beautification project funded entirely by the Friends of the Cemetery, and a plaque commemorating the project is attached to its base. Today, the cross and bench continue to provide a place for quiet contemplation among the oak trees.

Since the first project in 2003, the following projects have been funded in part or in their entirety by the Friends of the Cemetery program:

A New South Gate Entrance (2004)
Fencing along the South Side of the Cemetery (2005-2006)
Informational Kiosk (2009)
Infant Burial Area (2010)
A Columbarium (2010)
Veteran's Memorial Court (2013)
New Irrigation Water Well (2014)
